

ORPHEUS CHAMBER ORCHESTRA // PROJECT 2026-27

February & March 2027 with Branford Marsalis, saxophone & trumpet

Since their landmark 2001 album collaboration titled Creation, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and saxophonist Branford Marsalis have spent decades fine-tuning a connection that transcends stylistic labels. In their new project, they stir the American melting pot together.

Orpheus commissioned Javier Diaz to create a version for Orpheus' orchestra size, including a part for soprano and alto saxophones to allow Branford Marsalis to join the ensemble as a peer. The quintessential moment highlighting the intersection of American jazz and European classical music comes when the trumpet plays a sultry solo into the felt crown of a fedora hat (or a mute with a similar tone), a moment in which, according to Gershwin, "our American friend, perhaps after strolling into a café and having a couple of drinks, has succumbed to a spasm of homesickness." In this version, Branford Marsalis takes over trumpet solo parts adding his own improvisations as a soloist within the Orpheus orchestra.
